- 633 pupils (64%) achieved 100 or more points
- 261 pupils (27%) achieved an average of an ERA point every day in the school year, including during isolation and online learning

Wellbeing Room Up-Date

Some of you may remember that we started to develop a well-being room back in 2019.

Due to COVID-19 and lockdown restrictions, we have not been able to open this provision as widely as hoped. However, we have used the time to develop this room further and, even if we do say so ourselves, we are rather proud of the emerging provision.





Ever since I became a SENCo in 2012, I have wanted to develop a sensory area. Thanks to the time, effort and support of a number of our staff, this is becoming a reality and I am super excited for our pupils. The education support base (ES4) has been long over-due a make-over, and so earlier this year, I spent some time with one of our new TAs, Miss Summer, talking through my vision for the room. She then went away and designed a wonderful space which would provide a relaxing, calming and sensory environment.

During the May half term, I picked up my paintbrush and painted the room. The colour we went for was ombre as this is believed to have a calming effect when someone's emotions

are heightened. Miss Summer finished the blending off (due to my lack of artistic skills). The end effect was a beautiful and calming colour scheme which immediately transformed the room.

As the weeks have gone on, we have added items to the room in order to create the provision we want. With the continued support of the SEN Team and some of our wonderful pupils, we are adding items which are known to support well-being. We have some wonderfully soft throws on the sofas now to give a real sense of comfort and relaxation.

We have sensory pillows and exercise balls (which are proving to be extremely popular). The lighting is just lovely; we have some vertical lights and a bubble light tube. We also have a galaxy projector which has a Bluetooth speaker, so that we are able to play relaxing music to further add to the calming effect we want the room to have for our pupils.

Moving forwards, we will develop a plan of how we can best utilise this provision and safely open it up for those who need it. We still have work to do to perfect it, but we are so excited at the progress we have made so far.

Year 7 map out their future...


Our Year 7 geography groups have been working hard to produce some thoughtful and creative entries for the Royal Geographical Society's 'Young Geographer of the Year' award.

For this year's competition, entries had to be based around the theme 'Remapping Our Lives'. Our pupils created an annotated map that revealed how their lives have been shaped by the pandemic.

The cohort discussed and recorded ideas around how their local area has changed, and how their feelings about these places have changed. They then plotted the places and locations on a map. A removable layer of tracing paper was added to the map to represent how their feelings about these places have changed.

Pupils really enjoyed creating these maps; they thrived on the opportunity to try a practical activity in geography. In the near future, we hope to introduce pupils to mapping software on the computers, where they can create their own digital maps.

We also introduced the groups to some geography-based careers which are centred around mapping, including a 'GIS Specialist' who collates information and produces maps to help a range of industries, such as wildlife conservation, police or the army.

Year 10 Sports Studies Expedition

Despite the very warm June temperatures, our Year 10 sports studies cohort had very productive expeditions.

The groups walked a total of 11km, around the footpaths of the local area, showing their abilities of map reading and leaderships skills.

Before embarking on the walk, pupils showed basic camping skills by setting up a 'campsite' on the field, cooking themselves



a meal and then packing away – to simulate an actual camping expedition.



The expeditions were planned and completed by all Year 10 pupils who are on the sports studies course, so that they could gain evidence to support the completion of an outdoors activities unit. Alongside a completed exam

unit, this means that the groups have finalised two out of four of their units to gain their level 2 qualification.

During this academic year, learners in KS3 have had to cope with half of their computer science lessons taking place in a computer room and the other half in a normal classroom, learning the theory behind computer science.

We came up with lots of different learning activities for our pupils to do during this time, including making encryption computers with old Pringles tubes.

This term, Year 7 have learnt how search engines, such as Google, can sort and search through billions of websites in less than one second.

Here, class 7y1 are using playing cards to demonstrate how Google uses a Quicksort Algorithm and a Binary Search Algorithm when searching the web.

The new labs will bring a new **ERA** of learning to the science department and allow our pupils many opportunities to flourish within the subject field. Interactive white boards will also be installed in the four labs, allowing for a new teaching and learning experience for everyone. The refurbishment project commenced during May half term and we are expecting the new facilities to be available in September 2021.

This is the start of a site development journey and we are excited about this project and future prospective changes that lie ahead.

A New Partnership...

We are delighted to announce that with effect from July 2021, Montsaye Academy Sixth Form will be partnered with The Elephant Group.

The Elephant Access Programme provides a range of activities, trips and experiences to support pupils' aspirations, attainment and applications to top universities. They will help to ensure that our most academically capable pupils have access the top third of universities at the end of their time with us.

We will be working with a regional collaboration of head teachers in the East Midlands. Partners are also involved from top universities, including Oxford, Cambridge, Sheffield, York, Exeter, Newcastle, St George's Medical School, SOAS and King's College in London.

The programme kicks off this summer, with a number of our Year 12 cohort having signed up for a virtual summer school. This will allow pupils to gain guidance on university admissions and applications, receive careers information directly from employers and young professionals, and meet current undergraduates. Pupils will also participate in a team academic project centred on tackling real world



problems.

It's only natural to be concerned about whether your child is eating the right things, getting enough food and enjoying what's on the menu. That's why we put so much effort into getting our menus right.


