Inspirational words from Joseph

He spoke to us all about how he overcame his stammer and how it did not change his life. He also showed us a clip of when his teacher found a way to help him speak out loud. His story showed us the vital role teachers play in our lives. After the session, he spoke to me individually. We talked about how it feels to live with a stammer and ways to overcome it to be able to speak more fluently. Overall, it was great to hear from someone who had the same struggles as myself, but lives by the same ERA values as we have at Montsaye. He has shown us that resilience and aspiration can help us to succeed no matter what our difficulties are".

Learning Support Hub

Well, what a year! Our learning support department has worked hard this year to support our wonderful students with additional needs. We have so much to celebrate so here are a few highlights...

Wellbeing room: we painted our wellbeing room using an ombre design and freshened it up with some colourful (and rather comfortable) soft fluffy throws and cushions. This room is used for interventions, to support students with their wellbeing. It's lovely.



Magado, our elephant: earlier this year, Miss Owen adopted an elephant for the hub students. Magado is an elephant who lives in Kenya. We can track her movements which is super exciting. We also have a little display of elephant trivia to help us understand about Magado's life.

The chalkboard: this is changed frequently, to ensure that our students know about important events which link to their wellbeing and needs. It's colourful and engaging – the students really love this.

Cress: we did a little project around cress. This was linked to planting seeds, watering the plants to ensure they were cared for, measuring the growth and recording the colour of the cress. This became a bit of a competition to see which cress could grow the quickest.

Sensory activities: we have introduced some sensory activities to support our students' wellbeing. We have made various concoctions to find soothing textures, completed craft activities, created games, supported each other and found different ways of completing mindful activities.

Switch-on Reading

Following a successful pilot scheme which has taken place during this term, and as part of our targeted support for students, we are pleased to announce that Switch-on Reading will continue into the new academic year.

Switch-on Reading is a 10 week literacy intervention programme. We involve selected students from all year groups, to give them some extra support with their reading.

Our learning mentor, Mrs Tanser, sits with a student, 1:1, for 20 minutes each day, as part of their timetable, and delivers the sessions. The students also take home a short reading book for them to familiarise themselves with, by reading aloud. It begins with one book, but it progresses to two books in the following weeks.

We have purchased a new range of books, specifically tailored to the programme, covering various topics, both fiction and non-fiction, which have proved very popular with students. The course also fits in with the Accelerated Reader series of books which our students are already familiar with.

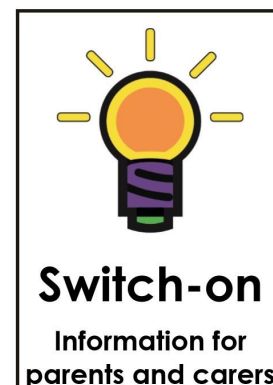
This is a great opportunity for parents, carers and all the family to get involved in reading. Students will benefit from practicing what becomes their 'familiar text' at home - this is a short passage of around 100 words in each book - a great excuse for 20 minutes' family time, to listen and then talk about what has just been read.

Callum plays for Scotland in under 18's Six Nations

During the Easter holiday, my son (and ex-Montsaye student, Callum), was in Marcoussis, France playing rugby for Scotland in the Under 18's Six Nations Tournament. Although Callum was born in England, he qualifies to play for Scotland due to our family's Scottish heritage.

Callum began playing rugby at Kettering Rugby Club when he was five years old and he loved it straight away. When he joined Montsaye in Year 7, he quickly became part of the academy team and was Captain for all of the games in which he played. Callum always enjoyed his rugby at Montsaye. At twelve years old, he joined Northampton Saints Developing Player Programme and eventually went on to join their Academy. At fourteen years of age, Callum was selected to play for the East Midlands.

In Year 10, Callum was offered a sixth form rugby scholarship at Oundle School. Two other establishments also offered him a scholarship but he eventually decided to go to Bedford School where he played in their first team as Forwards Captain. He is hoping to go to university and eventually to become a teacher.



Scottish Rugby showed an interest in Callum when he was fifteen years old. He was chosen to play in the under 16's in March 2020 but unfortunately, due to the pandemic, the training programme was suspended. Callum trained for several months at weekends in Edinburgh and was lucky enough to be chosen to play in the Under 18's Six Nations this year. He was so proud. For us as a family, to be able travel to France and watch him stand there, sing the National Anthem with the team, and then play in the games, was beyond amazing. Callum plays 'No. 1 loosehead prop' and occasionally 'No. 3 tighthead prop'.

Callum has always been very humble about his success in his sport, he is always surprised when he gets selected to play and doesn't quite realise what a good player he really is. We are very proud of him.

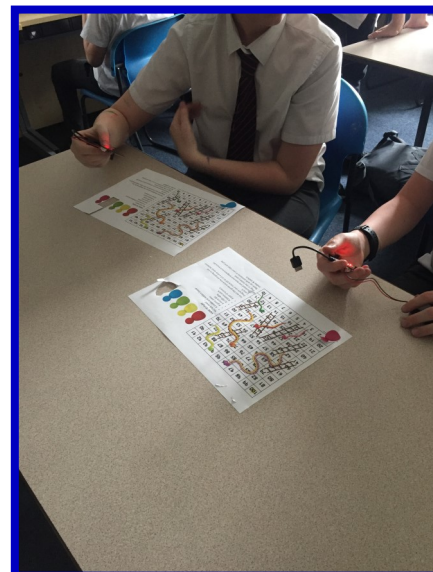
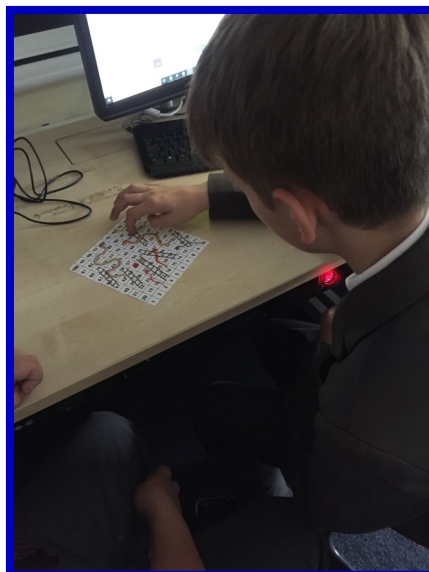
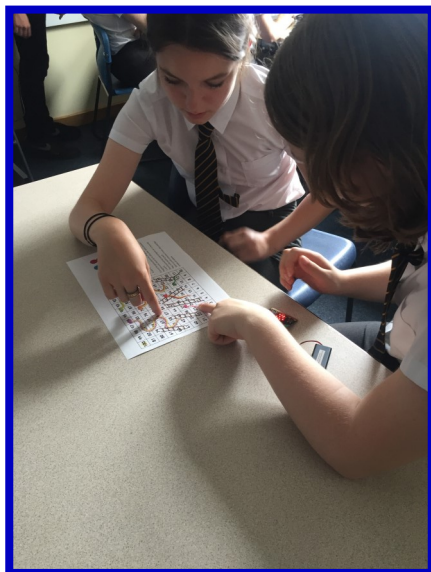

Year 7 at work on their programming skills...

Our Year 7 cohort have been having fun in their computer science lessons and learning how to program using Micro Bit mini computers.



Students had to program their Micro Bit to work like a die; when they shook the Micro Bit, it had to select a random number between 1 and 6 and display it on the screen. This helped them to learn two important principles in code design – sequence and selection. The lesson progressed to everyone being able to use their Micro bit to play snakes and ladders together.

This term across all subjects in our humanities department, students in Year 7 have designed their own country.



In the geography element, they produced a map of the physical features of their country, decided which types of energy were best and came up with a plan to manage against natural hazards. During EP, they decided on the style of government and the rules and laws. During the history element, students went back in time to explore the history of their country; they were even given an opportunity to see whether their country should have a civil war. The best projects were put forward for an end of year presentation and prizes awarded for the best country.

Year 8 delve into the past...



This term, in our Year 8 history lessons, we have been learning about World War I and looking at the lives of the soldiers on the Western Front. Students explored the main causes of the war, which plunged the world into a deadly conflict; something which still affects our modern world today.

We studied conditions in a typical trench on the Western Front, including looking at their key features and the effects they had on a soldier's health. Students examined the medical treatments which were used on the injured soldiers, including X-rays and blood transfusions; at the time, these were cutting edge developments in medicine. We learned about the evacuation system, which was developed by the RAMC (Royal Army Medical Corps), to transport injured soldiers away from 'No man's land'. These soldiers were taken from the first aid posts, all the way to the base hospitals in France and Great Britain. Students explored the role of the stretcher bearers, who put their lives on the line to save injured soldiers and transport them away to safety.

We brought the learning to life by going outside into the grounds of Montsaye Academy; to our very own 'Western Front' to re-enact the medical treatment and work of the stretcher bearers. During the outdoor lesson, we re-created a gas attack and the transportation of injured soldiers to the nearest first aid post; not many of our 'stretcher bearers' were able to make the 200m dash!

Back in the classroom, the year group continued with their learning, looking at the effects of World War I.

We have begun to study the Treaty of Versailles which students analyse at the start of Year 9, when learning about the causes of World War II.

Business Studies and Computer Science department get a makeover

Twelve months ago, our business and computer science department received some funding from the National Centre for Computing Education.

We decided to spend a proportion of the money on decorating some of our teaching rooms and also on a new flat screen for teaching in our post-16 base.

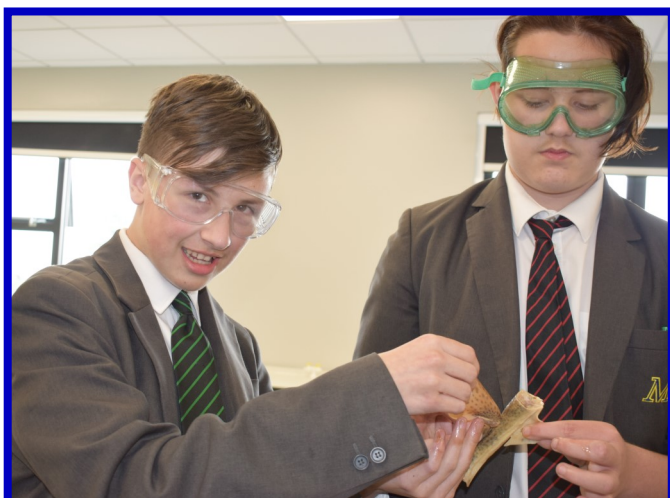
So far, we have decorated two computer rooms. Our business classroom will be decorated over the summer holiday period.



We have used some of the money to buy new computer equipment to use in our lessons, including Binary Logic kits, Micro Bit kits, two programmable robots and two interactive displays for teaching binary.

We say goodbye and good luck to Year 11...

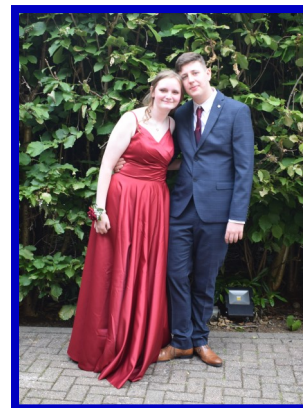

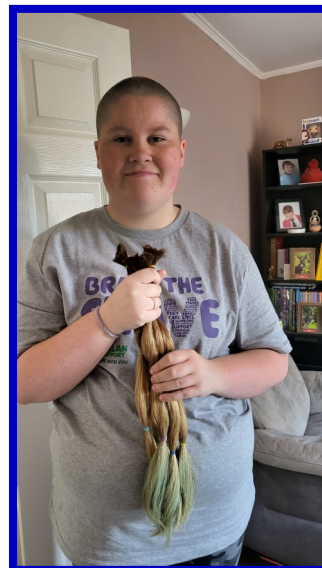


Year 11 student braves the shave

Goodbye and good luck to Year 13

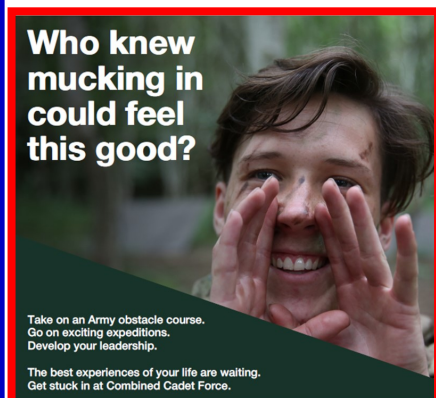
