






It has been an absolute honour to be able to share these events with our students, to celebrate their achievements and to enjoy their successes.

Special mentions go to Libby and Ava who were personally mentioned for their invaluable help during a javelin event at a recent primary school's athletics meeting; they are excellent role models.



Year 10 ERA Day

ERA day for Year 10 dawned bright and early, with a sense of anticipation. Our ERA days here at Montsaye are unique, helping students to develop the skills of **Excellence**, **Resilience** and **Aspiration**. Staff worked with Year 10 as they continue to follow their GCSE journey. Students undertook a range of activities designed to build physical, mental and emotional skills to help prepare them for the challenges which they face, either academically, online, within friendship groups or in the community.

Team building and communication activities proved extremely popular with an inflatable human table football game and STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) skills in a tower building session.





A careers session was run by Mrs Pitcher, our careers lead here at the academy; students explored post-16 options and started to consider the world beyond GCSEs. We believe that promoting the health and well-being of our students is an important part of their overall education. Two of the sessions focussed on theory and strategies to support mental health issues such as stress and anxiety. There was also a session on study skills.





The day was engaging and informative, allowing students to take time away from everyday activities of school life and get involved in useful, exciting sessions.

Courtroom Drama for Year 12...

s part of their A-level studies, our Year 12 historians have been researching the main causes for the collapse of the Soviet Union.

During one of our recent study sessions, we reenacted a courtroom-style lesson resulting in us being able to convict the main individual responsible for the Soviet Union's collapse. Students were split into three groups; one group was to defend Mikhail Gorbachev, another group was to defend Boris Yeltsin and the final group was to act as judge and jury. Each 'legal team' used the evidence available to construct their defence for their 'client' and the prosecution for the 'accused'.



After opening statements, cross-examination and closing statements, the court went for recess. This allowed the jury and the judges to reach their decision...Gorbachev was found guilty of causing the collapse of the Soviet Union.

The cohort worked really hard; their conduct and their professionalism was aspirational. Many of the students involved could definitely have careers in the judicial system, or as professional actors.

ur Year 12 business studies cohort recently took part in a 'Dragon's Den' style challenge. Students were given a brief to work from and had to innovate/invent a product, provide the product's design details, a sales forecast and an offer for the investment panel.





Several members of staff, from across a multitude of departments, came together to form the 'Dragons'. They judged the students on their creativity, business knowledge, presentation skills and ability to answer tricky questions. Among the products on offer was an automated butler, a collar which translated animal noises and a portable airier. The students put a great deal of time, effort and research into their presentations. The final decision was a difficult one, but the winning presentation was from Blue J., with his automated butler, 'Mr Handy'.

It's all about the sound effects...

Back in April, we were delighted to welcome former student and now professional technical sound composer, Will Lester, back to the academy.

Will delivered a workshop to Year 13 music student, Rhys who was recording coursework for his Year 13 Music Module "MUSPRA380 Create a sound library". This was part of a level 2 RSL Music Practitioner vocational course.





Rhys used household items to record ambient sounds into our music production software, Cubase, using a Rode NT-1 microphone. This process is called 'Foley Art'.

Gap Year Adventures for Grace...

One of our ex-students, Grace, has spent the last few months on a gap year adventure before heading off to university. Based at the southern edge of Liwonde National Park in Malawi, Grace has kept us up-to-date on her travels.

"In preparation for this trip, I had a lot of vaccinations, including rabies, hepatitis A and typhoid, and I also purchased a very large rucksack - one that is very heavy and difficult to lift when packed! I had to fill out lots of forms, medical, covid, visa, you name it I probably signed it. And then I booked my flights, I flew from Heathrow to Addis Ababa in Ethiopia, and from there to Lilongwe in Malawi. In total, it took me just over 20 hours to arrive at the sanctuary, only to then endure another 5 hour bus journey to the safari base. It was definitely worth it.

The facilities here are basic but fortunately we have flushing toilets and running water, as well as fans in our rooms for when the temperature peaks. My only struggle is having to walk across the base at night to use the toilets, my fear of spiders and snakes does not help me at all!!

Our day typically involves waking up at 5.00am to go on our morning drive at 6.00am, using telemetry to track animals as we go. We get back to the base around 10.00am to relax and take shelter from the sun, before heading back out from 3.00pm to 6.00pm for the afternoon drive, where we continue tracking and record any sightings of the monitored species.

What I've seen is indescribable, seeing these animals behave in their natural habitats with no humans nearby is incredible, and I'm so appreciative to have been given this opportunity. I've watched elephants bathe themselves in the river, crocs and hippos swim and dive under the water, gibbons groom each other and so many other wonderful sights that will stay with me forever.

Experiencing the local culture of the communities, their way of life and their passion towards wildlife is inspiring, yet also so humbling. When visiting the nearby towns, I'm in awe of the people's strength and also their capabilities. Watching the communities build homes and



basic infrastructure from such simple materials; witnessing first hand how happy these people are, despite living in severe poverty, and how different their attitudes are to back home is eye opening and so so rewarding".

We are so very proud of Grace for following her dream. A true example of a Montsaye ERA student.
