Montsaye Cadets hone their skills...

Montsaye CCF (Combined Cadet Force) recently spent a weekend at Chetwynd Barracks in Nottingham to conduct weapon training with the SA80 for their WHT, (Weapon Handling Test). This was a prerequisite for the summer camp in Scotland, where they conducted live firing with SA80.

The cohort arrived on the Friday afternoon, with the training taking place on the Saturday and Sunday. For many of the cadets, it was the first time they had been in a military barracks, they loved it.



The training involved lessons 1-9 from the characteristics of the weapon to stripping, cleaning and putting it back together. It also involved safe handling of the weapon, how to adopt the correct position for firing, prone, sitting, kneeling and standing. The cadets were taught about stoppages with the weapon, how to recognise them and how to remedy them. There was one final lesson on the Sunday morning, which was followed by the WHT test. I am pleased to report that everyone passed and the cadets were fully prepared for their summer camp in Scotland.

Year 12 Summer Term of Enrichment

After saying a sad goodbye to our Year 13 students, we have been able to give our Year 12 students a packed couple of months of enrichment activities, aimed at supporting their next steps post-Sixth Form.

Students have started to prepare their UCAS forms, ready to submit their university applications in September. This has been supported by two university visits, the first for a University Experience Day at Nottingham Trent university, and the second to the UCAS Higher Education Convention at the University of Lincoln.

We have an excellent relationship with our alumni and have been lucky enough to welcome back many of our past students this term to talk to current students about Year 11 Taster Event their time at university. Our alumni speakers have included Eve (Biology at the University of Sheffield), Ione (Law at Durham University) and Ryan (History at Loughborough University) to name but a few.



We also had a visit from Andy from the MAN Group, who gave our students an overview of careers in the Finance, Banking and Investment industry. This was followed up by a useful session on financial awareness, and a group Trading Game, where students had a virtual £1000 to invest in a series of well-known companies.



Finally, many of our students have been successful in gaining a work experience placement this month. We have sent students to golf courses, animal shelters, primary schools, council offices and the hospital, among others. We are very grateful to every company that has accommodated one of our students; it is so important that we offer our students the chance to experience the world of work.

As we entered the last couple of weeks of this academic year, we certainly didn't slow down. Our biologists and geographers went out conducting field work visits, and the English Literature students visited Shakespeare's Globe to watch a performance of 'Much Ado About Nothing'.

We were delighted to welcome the next batch of Sixth Form students to our annual Taster Event in June. Students were treated to a welcome breakfast of pastries, fruit and juices, before a welcome talk from Mrs. Jones and the rest of the sixth form team. Goodies to help the cohort get through the day were on offer.



The remainder of the day gave students the chance to sample four different A-level lessons, and to give them a flavour of what life as a Montsaye Sixth Form student is really like.

CCF Annual Camp: Barry Buddon, Angus

During July, Montsaye Academy's CCF (Combined Cadet Force) was away at their annual camp at Barry Buddon Training Area in Angus, Scotland. The first challenge for the cadets was the journey; an early 7.30am start was followed by a nine hour drive over rambling A-roads before arriving at the camp at around 4.00pm.

On the first day, the cadets spent their time going over their weapons handling drills and marksmanship principles. This was to ensure they were safe (and accurate) when live and blank firing later in the week.

Due to worrying weather warnings, our 24hr field exercise was moved from Tuesday to Monday. This exercise involved cadets packing all they would need to survive for 24 hours in a bergen, including a sleep shelter and sleeping bag, cooking equipment, and a military issued 24hr ration pack. After breakfast on Monday morning, cadets took their rifles from the armoury and, after a safety briefing, marched from the main camp to the training area.

Upon arrival, cadets alternated between setting up camp and going out on silent patrol to complete tasks and collect intelligence for the ambush later that day. Once all the intel had been collected, cadets were issued with blank ammunition and patrolled over to the site to prepare an ambush for enemy targets.

A night under the stars with ration packs for dinner and breakfast followed, before the section attacks on Tuesday morning. The attacks proceeded without a hitch and particular commendation goes to Sgt. Arnold and SSgt. Linsdell for leading their sections on this task.

The rest of Tuesday was spent cleaning weapons and allowing cadets to recover from the exercise before picking up the round robin tasks on Wednesday. The tasks consisted of a map reading exercise, a silent drill test, a paintball ambush and defence, a stalking exercise, and an observation point task. The male cadets showed admirable enthusiasm during the paintball exercise and the females showed exceptional skill during the drill task scoring 81 of 100 points for their silent drill. The boys were recognised for their ability in the observation point We would also like to thank the cadets and staff of Sir exercise and LCpl. Debiec and Sgt. Murphy were commended for their success in the navigation task.

On Thursday, we travelled to Edinburgh castle where cadets took in the history of the site. We saw the various prisons within the walls, the banqueting hall, Scottish Crown Jewels, and Scottish War Memorial among other

things. We watched the 1.00pm gun fire and were able to take in the remarkable views of the city.

On our final day, we were firing on the ranges. Many cadets were nervous heading into this activity but every single cadet overcame their fears, fired more than 30 live rounds and passed their basic shooting test. This was an incredible success, and the range staff were particularly impressed with our contingent's weapon drills and marksmanship. Particular commendation must be given to Cdt. Johnson who scored highest on the basic shoot, achieving the 'marksman' badge, and joint highest in the advanced shoot with Cdt. A. Jelly. both of whom earned their first-class badge for the advanced shoot.

The camp ended with a presentation ceremony. This involved all of the English contingents on camp and was opened and closed with a pipe-led procession. The end of the camp was marked with a disco; cadets danced away whatever energy they had left.



We would like to express our gratitude to the Cadet Training Team at Barry Buddon for an excellent camp. I am sure I speak for every cadet and staff member who attended when I say that the memory of it will stay with us for a long time.
