



Boomwhacking up a storm...

ne of our Year 8 classes (8T) have surpassed all expectations this term with their incredible work using Boomwhackers. A Boomwhacker is a lightweight, hollow, colour-coded, plastic tube which is tuned to a musical pitch by length. They are used as musical instruments and are part of the percussion family. They were first produced by Mr Craig Ramsell in 1995.



The class have so far performed 'Africa' by Toto and the 'Ghostbusters' main theme. The pitch and harmony have been completely accurate in both pieces, but what makes 8T so special, is that there are so few of them. As the smallest class in the academy, under normal circumstances it would be impossible for us to cover all of the parts. Not to be defeated, everyone involved showed the true ERA value of resilience and all pupils play at least two pitches, if not three, at the same time.

This particular group of pupils have inspired me to start a lunchtime Boomwhacker club, exclusively for Year 8, every Friday. New members are always welcome.

Year 12 develop confidence in their drawing skills

Our Year 12 art group have been completing a range of drawing exercises aimed to encourage and develop creativity and confidence in their work and skills. The exercises forced everyone to work out of their comfort zones.





Some pieces were produced using very short time limits, in order to push mark-making techniques and expressive qualities. Other exercises controlled the materials the pupils had to work with. Questioning the notion of what makes a successful drawing was a clear discussion point, as was the emphasis of recording what you see with a personal mark being the focus.

All pupils showed off the school's ERA values with their approach towards this work. They all persevered against their natural instinct and a desire to feel safe with white paper and a pencil, to explore and experiment with new ways of working, building up a creative and imaginative portfolio of observational drawings for A-Level art.

ERA: PE takes on 'Race The Sun Challenge'

Being advocates for movement and physical activity, four of our PE teachers have decided to enter a team in the Race the Sun Challenge in September, raising money for the UK charity, Action Medical Research for Children. The charity raises funds for vital research to help defeat the diseases that devastate the lives of sick and disabled babies, children and young people.

The event takes place in the heart of the Lake District National Park. It involves cycling for forty miles around the imposing Skiddaw mountain, navigating a two mile canoe course on Derwent water and finally, summiting Skiddaw on an eleven mile round trip (to



an altitude of 931 metres). The hike climbs towards Latrigg on the outskirts of Keswick, before the path gets steeper, zig-zagging onwards and upwards. All of the challenges are to be completed between dawn and dusk in one day. Year 13 University Destinations Round-Up


