The day started with an excellent drama presentation from the HOPE theatre company, looking at the impact of bullying on someone's life. The theme of kindness was further developed in tutor groups, looking at the research that shows performing acts of kindness helps with wellbeing, not only of the recipient but also the giver. Year 8 are continuing this work on kindness by collecting donations from students across the school for local food banks in the run up to Christmas.



A workshop session on managing emotions was expertly led by Beccy Nettleton from AmplifYouth, an organisation which works with young people to help them overcome challenges. Tutors went on to develop this further, in sessions on emotional intelligence. As many parents will know, Year 8 can be a tricky time for many children as they enter their teens; dealing with difficult and changing feelings is a vital skill for them to develop.

Looking at future aspirations, through the Speakers for Schools programme, we were lucky enough to welcome Adrian Gorham, Head of Business Operations at Telefonika UK, to talk to the students about his progress from a not very successful student to where he is now. Students asked him a range of thoughtful questions, although the one they seemed most excited about was whether he got a free phone and unlimited data.



In a rather more active session, Mrs Bateman and Mrs Lopes demonstrated their impressive juggling skills, leading workshops designed to build the students' resilience through learning to juggle. These workshops were very much enjoyed and the students demonstrated amazing levels of resilience and skill. ## Scientists of the future...



We recently took fourteen of our Year 11 science students to Cambridge University for the annual Physics at Work exhibition. There were around twenty-five exhibits and we were given six to visit.

There were exhibits from companies such as Rolls Royce, who talked about their work with nuclear submarines and Domino Printing who showed us their range of laser and ink printers. There were also exhibits from current Cambridge University researchers and teachers who covered their work on material science, super-conductors and vision using helium atoms.

Each exhibit consisted of a short presentation, a practical demonstration and opportunities for hands-on experience by the students. You shouldn't pick favourites but I will; the exhibit on superconductors was amazing, they are currently researching materials that could have high temperature superconductivity. A superconductor is a material with zero resistance, therefore no heat dissipates, which means you can have higher current in the same space. Why is this so exciting? It is the possibility of the 'Back to the Future' hoverboards finally being built!

Another favourite was the **S**canning **He**lium **M**icroscope (SHeM). This is a novel form of microscopy that uses low energy (5-100 meV) neutral helium atoms to image the surface of a sample, without causing any damage to the sample by the imaging process. This technology is so current, that it was only built this year. I hope that the trip has inspired our students to realise the wide range of possible careers that are available within STEM (science technology, engineering and mathematics) subjects.

#### A-Level Science Live: Chemistry

On the 20<sup>th</sup> of November, our A-Level chemistry group went to the University of Birmingham to attend the Science Live event which consisted of six lectures from renowned scientists and an examiner.

The first lecture of the day was from Dr Suze Kundu, a nanotechnology expert who studied for a PhD in Materials Chemistry at University College London. She discussed the uses of nanotechnology and the new discoveries that are being made within the world of 'tiny technology.' The next lecture was by Professor Andrea Sella who spoke about the



chemistry of nerve agents. He lectured about how the controversial chemistry of nerve agents was initially beneficial science to us but was corrupted and became the deadly science that is now nerve agents. Professor Lucy Carpenter then spoke about atmosphere and climate change. She discussed what we could do to prevent climate change and the numbers behind the changing pollution in the atmosphere. Before the examiner session, Professor Peter Atkins spoke to us about energy, and how the energy in the universe is transferred, but also the myth that there is no energy in the universe.

During the examiner session, we discussed exam techniques and how to pass A-Level exams. Finally, Dr Peter Wothers explained the history of the periodic table and how it has changed over time, from Mendeleev's original model, to the current periodic table.

Overall, the day was very educational and further cemented our motivation with our A-Levels, as well as helping us to understand how to succeed with our exams. Our favourite lecture of the day was by Professor Andrea Sella, as the usually controversial topic of nerve agents was very interesting and felt it was very relevant to today.

### Academy welcomes election candidates

n the lead up to the general election, we were lucky enough to be able to hold a Hustings event at Montsaye Academy. This was attended by four candidates and a representative from the Liberal Democrats as the candidate was working (he is a teacher) and couldn't attend:

- Conservative: Philip Hollobone
- Labour: Claire Pavitt
- Lib Dem: Jenny Jones (stand in for Chris Nelson)
- **Green:** Jamie Wildman
- Independent: Jim Hakewill

Listening attentively, were our Year 9 and Sixth Form students, many of whom are not eligible to vote yet. After a two minute introduction from each of the candidates, they faced a range of questions posed by the students. These included subjects on bullying, league tables and the marketization of schools, the struggling NHS and the local impact each candidate might have.

The Green candidate, Jamie Wildman, was strongly focused on the environment, saying that his priorities were, "action on climate change, urgent action and a  $2^{nd}$  referendum because what we voted for is not what we got." He went on to say, "It's essential we safeguard environmental legislation from the EU and rebuild the relationship we have with them."

The Conservative candidate, Philip Hollobone, stated that, "61% of local voters chose to leave. My pledge is to back the deal so that we can leave the EU. Once that is done, we can move on to the people's priorities; the NHS, police and schools."

Liberal Democrat, Jenny Jones, said of the candidate Chris Nelson, "Chris was born and brought up in Kettering and is dedicated to the area and strongly involved in politics."



"The Liberal Democrats are strongly opposed to Brexit and will do anything we can to stop it. We are also dedicated to the environment and we want to take action to stop climate change."

Claire Pavitt from the Labour Party, began by explaining her passion for education, "I have been a labour party candidate for about 18 years. It was labour party policies that gave me the chance to go back into education. I am passionate that the education system gives you the future you deserve."

Finally, the Independent candidate, Jim Hakewill connected with the audience when he said, "My campaign is about electing someone who is passionate about this area and has lived here all of their life. All of my children came to Montsaye, had a great education and all went to university. I want that for you. We have been campaigning for the link road between the health centre and the main road and also to save the library. You need to trust the person that you elect."

The event was enjoyed by students and staff alike and left all who attended, better informed about the upcoming general election.


