Drop Everything and Read: Building a Culture of Strong Readers at Montsaye

They say that a picture tells a thousand words, but I believe that a good book creates a new world where imaginations soar and people, young and old, can get lost in literature. All this time, students are developing key literacy skills that, unbeknownst to most, will help them to succeed, not only in assessments and exams, but also with future aspirations and careers. This is something very little will achieve through Fortnite.

Since joining the academy in July, I have been staggered with the level of engagement, access and provision that we offer to students through the DEAR (drop everything and read) initiative. Each day, students and staff stop what they are doing and sit down for 20 minutes to enjoy a good book: this is firmly establishing a culture of reading in the school, which students will benefit from for years to come. What's more, students are used to and enjoy the addition of daily reading to their academic diet.

Ellie H., Year 8, says: "In lessons, I like DEAR because it helps me develop my reading skills and gives me a wider vocabulary. I can already see this in my writing. The more you read, the more words you pick up, the more you can use in your written work." It is not just students who feel the buzz, though. Mr. Brothers from humanities says: "Having twenty minutes of DEAR everyday has hugely improved our school. So many students have become engaged in their reading that you can hear a pin drop around the building and it's a struggle to get them to put their books away."

Reading for pleasure equals success in terms of GCSE examinations. If a student reads for 1 minute each day, over the course of secondary school, they will have only read 8,000 words. Compare that to a student that reads for at least 20 minutes per day: a vocabulary of over 1,800,000 words (Nagy & Herman, 1987). This culture is growing strong at Montsaye: in the coming months, years or even decades, the young people of our community will benefit from this.

Montsaye celebrates exam results success...

Montsaye Academy is celebrating another improved set of GCSE grades for our Year 11 students. There was a real 'buzz' in the main hall on results day with anxious students and parents waiting to open the all-important envelope.

Over seventy-five of our Year 11 students met the threshold to study A-levels and take the next step on their academic pathway. Almost all of the students who wanted to study level 2/3 vocational courses, or take up apprenticeships, got onto their first choice course or training. This set of results saw the academy's attainment scores improve again overall and in the core subjects of maths and English.

This year, almost all subjects are now taking the new GCSE courses which are graded 9-1. Montsaye Academy scooped 36 grade 9s this year, with 17 of these coming from the science department. Other notable subject successes include maths, biology, business studies and food, where students achieved grades 7-9, which were above provisional national results.

Some individual highlights to share are below:

- Alana T. who achieved seven 9s, two 8s, one A* and one 7.
- Adam B. who achieved seven 9s, one 8, one 7, one A and one 4.
- Jake S. who achieved four 9s, two 8s, one Distinction*, one 7 and two 6s.
- Zara H. who achieved four 9s, two 8s, one A*, one 7, one 6 and one 5.
- Louise W. who achieved four 9s, three 8s, two 6s, one 5 and one C.
- Holly B. who achieved three 9s, five 8s, one 7 and one A.
- Adam S. who achieved one 9, four 8s, three 7s, one B and two 5s.
- Hannah C. who achieved one 9, three 8s, one A, one Distinction, three 6s and one 5.



Principal, Meena Gabbi said: "I am exceptionally pleased that the results have continued to improve against a back-drop of nationally harder GCSE qualifications. This is testament to the hard work of our staff and students, as Montsaye Academy continues to go from strength to strength".

Cross-department collaboration allowed pupils to use their ratio skills to good effect, in a flapjack baking lesson. Strawberry laces proved as sweet as 'Pi' when using semicircles to recreate scale models of athletics tracks, with jelly bean markers for the starting positions.

By the third week, endless variations of paper helicopters had been constructed, trialled and improved, students establishing their own hypotheses for slowest descent or fastest rotations, and some of the most successful 'homework-cakes' were being showcased around the school. Year 7 rose to the challenge with enthusiasm and resilience, and can look forward to further practical, hands-on mathematical experiences as they continue their Montsaye journey.

It was a great day and it has helped us to start to think about our next steps after sixth form.



Examination Information

29th October to 16th November 2018...

The timetable was sent out in the first week of October and can also be found on the exams noticeboard in the covered walkway next to reception and outside the exams office.

Candidates have been emailed their exam numbers which will not change until they leave Montsaye Academy. The exam number, sometimes known as the 'candidate number', is used by the examining boards to identify work and award grades. It should be entered on the front of all papers, when instructed to do so by the invigilator in an exam.

A reminder that the following items **MUST NOT BE** BROUGHT INTO ANY EXAMS:

- Mobile phones or smart devices, including fitness watches.
- Earphones.
- Notes, paper or tissues.
- Bus passes.
- Opaque bottles or liquids.
- Writing on the skin. .
- Books or guides, unless provided by the school • and approved by the exams officer.
- Hoodies or outerwear.
- Corrector fluid or tape.

Candidates MUST ALWAYS BRING:

- Black pens and pencils.
- Sharpener.
- Maths instruments (but not in a tin and any case must be transparent).
- Calculator (without a lid) for applicable exams.
- Ruler.
- Highlighters (if desired). •

Candidates ARE ALLOWED TO BRING:

The Year 11 mock examination dates are Monday exam papers. An exam kit can be purchased from the LRC for £1.00, or £11.00 for a kit containing a scientific calculator.

> Seating plans will be available outside the timetabled exam rooms before the exam begins. Candidates should familiarise themselves with their allocated seat number before arriving for the exam. The bag room will be opened 10 minutes before the start of the exam. Candidates must be on time for all their exams. It is completely at the discretion of the invigilator whether students arriving late will be permitted to sit the exam.

> All Year 11 students have been issued with a copy of the exam conditions, which sets out the rules of the exam room. Any breaches will be reported and could potentially result in the disqualification of the candidate.
