**Homework 1** - Learn the keywords below for a mini test at the start of next lesson. You could read through the words, write them out, create a match up activity or get someone to test you.

**Judaism** The religion of Jews

**Jews** Followers of Judaism

**Torah** Jewish Holy Book, includes the first 5 books of the Bible

**Hanukkah** Jewish festival of light to remember defeating the Maccabee army

**Menorah** Candelabrum used in Jewish worship, has 8 branches where candles sit

**Passover** Jewish festival to remember children of Israel who were led out of slavery

**Abraham** Founder of Judaism who had a covenant with God

**Moses** Leader and prophet of Judaism who led the slaves out of Egypt

**Homework 2** – Creative task. You are going to write an answer which shows an understanding of the spiritual, emotional and cultural experiences of religious believers.

You are going to imagine you were one of the people who was led out of Egypt by Moses. You must include at least 3 of the following:

- How did you feel when you knew you were going to be saved?
- Were you going to miss anything from your old life?
- What was your reaction to seeing the parting of the sea?
- What were you most looking forward to in your new land?
- How did it feel to have someone say God had spoken to them?

Note – if you struggle to write in the first person (e.g. I went, I saw) then you can write a newspaper article instead

<p>Rama and Sita were banished. Ravana, the 10 head Demon king kidnapped Sita using a trick. Rama asked a flying monkey to help.</p> <p>Sita was found and Rama used a special bow and arrow from the Gods to kill Ravana and save Sita. People put oil lamps (divas) in their windows to guide them home.</p> <p style="text-align: center;"><b>Diwali</b></p> <p>5 day Festival of Light to celebrate Ramayana; triumph of good over evil and light over darkness. Celebrates joy, knowledge and wealth.</p> <p>Hindus decorate places with oil lamps, use fireworks and share sweets.</p> <p>Lakshmi, the Goddess of wealth, is worshipped as the bringer of blessings for the new year.</p>		<p>Moses, an Israelite, was put in a basket on the Nile to stop him being killed as a boy. Pharaoh's daughter found him and brought him up.</p> <p>Moses killed an Egyptian and fled. God spoke to Moses as a burning bush. Told to free the slaves and take the promised land. Pharaoh refused, Moses warned of bad things; The Ten Plagues.</p> <p>The 10<sup>th</sup> was to kill every Egyptian first-born son. Israelite houses put lamb blood on the door so the angel would 'pass-over'</p> <p style="text-align: center;"><b>Passover</b></p> <p>The celebration of a journey from slavery to freedom. Seder is eaten: Matzo bread – Israelites fled without time to yeast their dough Lamb – Sacrifice Egg – Jews' determination Salt water – Slaves tears Bitter herbs – Bitterness of slavery</p>		<p>Guru Gobind Singh created the Khalsa, family of pure Sikhs who had been through the Amrit ceremony of initiation.</p> <p>Take on new names, Singh or Kaur and wear the 5 K's.</p> <p>Guru Gobind Singh declared the Sikh holy book as his successor instead of a human being. This was the Guru Granth Sahib, Sikh's guide forever.</p> <p style="text-align: center;"><b>The 5 K's</b></p> <p><b>Kesh</b> – Uncut hair God's gift, strength and holiness</p> <p><b>Kara</b> – Steel bracelet God has no beginning or end</p> <p><b>Kanga</b> – Wooden comb Clean body and mind</p> <p><b>Kachera</b> – Cotton underwear Symbol of chastity</p> <p><b>Kirpan</b> – Steel sword Defence of the good and weak</p>				
<b>Key Teachings</b>		<b>Amrit Ceremony</b> Initiation ceremony to commit fully to the Khalsa. Amrit is drunk and sprinkled on eyes and hair. Recite the beliefs and ends with sweet food that has been blessed.
